

special," Singh said.



He started his practice in Ranson 10 years ago, then moved to the Mountainview Medical Center in Charles Town four years ago when that building was built.

As a clinical assistant professor for the West Virginia University School of Medicine, Singh occasionally conducts lectures and also works with medical students who rotate through his office.

Since Singh started at Jefferson Medical Center, he said he's seen a lot of positive changes, with more and more technological improvements available for patients.

But beyond the latest in diagnostics and equipment,
